Plants for Shade

Shrubs that will bloom in shade:

Camellia (takes more drought than rhodys)

Daphnes: Daphne odora, D. mezerum (will take drought)

Enkianthus sp. (needs water)

Fuchsia - species fuchsias like F. magellanica (little water)

Hydrangea macrophylla and other hydrangeas (need water)

Mahonia sp. - all the Oregon grapes (take drought)

Osmanthus – all types can take dry or nearly dry shade

Pieris japonica – lily of the valley shrub

Sarcococca - all species take dry shade

Viburnum, various - V. carleesii

Vaccinium sp. Huckleberries

Herbaceous perennials for DRY SHADE sites (part shade, not full sun)

Anemone japonica - Japanese anemone

Campanula - many esp. c. lactiflora

Dicentra sp. - bleeding heart (disappears in late summer)

Epimedium - Bishop's hat - probably the best for dry shade, spring bloom

Geranium oxonianum 'Claridge Druse" - hardy geranium

Hellebores - all - will take full shade

Iris foetidissima – Gladwin iris (red berries in fall)

Lamium – all, but they are invasive

Liriope gigantean - seldom used, good in this area

Tiarella cordifolia – foamflower

Any spring bulb that is dormant by the summer dry season ...scilla, small narcissus, trillium, muscari, chionodoxa

Annuals for Shady Gardens - all for part shade

Ageratum

Bellis perennis (English Daisy)

Iberis umbellate – annual candytuft

Begonia, various

Browallia americana – amethyst flower

Coleus – all (the up and coming annual!)

Impatiens, of course

Nicotiana alata 'Grandiflora'

Torenia sp. – wishbone flower
